## Digital Storytelling - Media Arts 1

A digital story is a video that combines photographs, video, music, and sound effects into a personal reflection on a subject. They are shared from the perspective of the creator about experiences lived. Often they feel as if the author is aware of a new insight being shared in the story. They can be straight-forward or experimental, the digital story puts self-expression and self-awareness over concerns of publication and audience.

Students will learn story structure/development, exercise creative writing in developing voice over, and learn non-linear editing while combining imagery, voice-over, and music. In-class time will be split between lectures and independent work time. Students will complete three videos over the course of the class.

## Class structure:

- Online
  - o Lecture 30-60 min
  - o Independent Work Time 30-60 min
  - All students will stay signed into the digital classroom while working independently in case they have questions or need assistance.

Course Time Frame: 18-22 weeks (1 Trimester)

60 minutes in-class/week ~30 minutes homework/week
